GRAPEFRUIT was originally published in a limited edition of 500 copies by the Wunternaum Press in Tokyo in 1964.


This new edition contains material from the original, and pieces and drawings done in subsequent years by Yoko Ono.

Decide on one note that you want to play. Play it with the following accompaniment:

ECHO TELEPHONE PIECE

Get a telephone that only echoes back your voice. Call every day and talk about many things.

1964 spring

BICYCLE PIECE FOR ORCHESTRA

Ride bicycles anywhere you can in the concert hall. Do not make any noise.

1962 autumn

TAPE PIECE I

Stone Piece

Take the sound of the stone aging.

TAPE PIECE II

Room Piece

Take the sound of the room breathing.

- 1) at dawn
- 2) in the morning
- 3) in the afternoon
- 4) in the evening
- 5) before dawn

Bottle the smell of the room of that particular hour as well.

TAPE PIECE III

Snow Piece

Take a tape of the sound of the snow falling.
This should be done in the evening.
Do not listen to the tape.
Cut it and use it as strings to tie gifts with.
Make a gift wrapper, if you wish, using the same process with a phonosheet.

CONCERT PIECE

When the curtain rises, go hide and wait until everybody leaves you.
Come out and play.

HIDE-AND-SEEK PIECE

Hide until everybody goes home. Hide until everybody forgets about you. Hide until everybody dies.

STONE PIECE

Find a stone that is your size or weight. Crack it until it becomes fine powder. Dispose of it in the river. (a)
Send small amounts to your friends. (b)
Do not tell anybody what you did.
Do not explain about the powder to the friends to whom you send.

TUNAFISH SANDWICH PIECE

Imagine one thousand suns in the sky at the same time.
Let them shine for one hour.
Then, let them gradually melt into the sky.
Make one tunafish sandwich and eat.

PAINTING FOR THE SKIES

Drill a hole in the sky.
Cut out a paper the same size as the hole.
Burn the paper.
The sky should be pure blue.

A PAINTING TO SEE THE SKY III

See the sky between a woman's thighs. See the sky between your own thighs. See the sky through your belongings by making holes in them.

i.e., pants, jacket, shirt, stockings, etc.

PAINTING UNTIL IT BECOMES MARBLE

Cut out and hang a painting, design, a photograph, or a writing (printed or otherwise), that you like.

Let visitors cut out their favorite parts and take them.

For example, if the visitor likes red, let him take all the red parts.

Ask many visitors to cut out their favorite parts until the whole thing is gone.

Also, instead of cutting the parts out, you may ask them to paint black ink over them.

In case of the writing, you ask the visitor to cut out his favorite letter or word.

PAINTING TO ENLARGE AND SEE

1961 summer

CANNON PIECE

Paste your name on the window. Borrow a cannon. Go to a distance and fire against your name.

The name can be a name or a number taken out at random from a telephone book.

If a cannon is not available, you may use machine-guns, arrows, stones, spitting, urinating, hose-water, or any other method.

If nothing is available, go and watch until the name becomes unrecognizable by sunset.

You may use telescopes to watch.

KITE PIECE I

Borrow the Mona Lisa from the gallery. Make a kite out of it and fly. Fly it high enough so the Mona Lisa smile disappears. (a) Fly it high enough so the Mona Lisa face disappears. (b) Fly it high enough so it becomes a dot. (c)

KITE PIECE II

Every year on a certain day, collect old paintings such as De Kooning, Klein, Pollack.

Make kites with them and fly.

Fly them high enough and cut the strings so they will float.

KITE PIECE III

Enlarge your photograph(s) and make many kites and fly.
When the sky is filled with them, ask people to shoot.
You may make balloons instead of kites.

COLOR PIECE

Visual world not exactly shaped-Sense of smell, anticipation, senses that are not exactly shaped-Dark shadows casted-Rat colors with faint hairly smells and pale dark spots like those on a transparent sheet of celluloid-Rose color with a glitter and softness that is cool and motional-The kind of color that does not exist by itself but only when it is casted between two moving objects-The color like a remaining stain of illusion on a moving object-The color that only happens when movements cut the air in a certain way and go immediately. Use such color to tint your absent thoughts. Have absent thoughts for a long time.

RUBBER PIECE

Imagine your body spreading rapidly all over the world like thin tissue. Imagine cutting out one part of the tissue.

Cut out the same size rubber and hang it on the wall beside your bed.

CENTRAL PARK POND PIECE

Go to the middle of the Central Park Pond and drop all your jewelries.

1956 autumn

PEA PIECE

Carry a bag of peas. Leave a pea wherever you go.

1960 winter

ANNOUNCEMENT PIECE I

Give death announcements each time you move instead of giving announcements of the change of address.

Send the same when you die.

1962 summer

ANNOUNCEMENT PIECE II

Give a moving announcement each time you die.

1963 summer

FLY PIECE

Fly.

1963 summer

CLOCK PIECE

Select a clock.
Set it on time.
You may rewind the clock but never reset it.
Call it your life clock.
Live accordingly.

1964 spring

THROWING PIECE

Throw a stone into the sky high enough so it will not come back.

MIRROR PIECE

Instead of obtaining a mirror, obtain a person.
Look into him.
Use different people.
Old, young, fat, small, etc.

1964 spring

ROOM PIECE

When a room is needed, obtain a person instead of a room.

Live on him.

When another room is needed, obtain another person instead of another room.

Live on them.

LIGHT PIECE

Carry an empty bag.
Go to the top of the hill.
Pour all the light you can in it.
Go home when it is dark.
Hang the bag in the middle of your room in place of a light bulb.

CONVERSATION PIECE

Talk about the death of an imaginary person.
If somebody is interested, bring out

If somebody is interested, bring out a black framed photograph of the deceased and show.

If friends invite you, excuse yourself by explaining about the death of the person.

DOLLAR PIECE

Select an amount of dollar.
Imagine all the things that
you can buy with that amount.(a)
Imagine all the things that
you cannot buy with that amount.(b)
Write it on a piece of paper.

SYLLABLE PIECE

Decide not to use one particular syllable for the rest of your life. Record things happened to you in result of that.



DANCE PIECE FOR STAGE PERFORMANCE

Dance in pitch dark.
Ask audience to light a match if they want to see.

A person may not light more than one match.

Dance Report — on floating (or how to make the city so light that it floats away in the sky)

Carry a stone. Go on carrying heavier stones until they become so heavy that the whole city starts to look lighter than what you are carrying.

INFORMATION

CUT PIECE

Cut.

This piece was performed in Kyoto, Tokyo, New York and London. It is usually performed by Yoko Ono coming on the stage and in a sitting position, placing a pair of scissors in front of her and asking the audience to come up on the stage, one by one, and cut a portion of her clothing (anywhere they like) and take it. The performer, however, does not have to be a woman.

BEAT PIECE

Listen to a heartbeat.

This was first performed in 1965 at the East End Theatre, New York, by people coming on stage and lying on each other's body to listen.

DISAPPEARING PIECE

Boil water.

This piece was first performed in New York, 1966, by only five people. This was not deliberate, but probably due to the subway strike in New York at the time. The water was boiled in a still, until it came out of the other side of the still, which took two hours. In London 1966, Mercury Theatre, the boiling of the water, the size of the pot in which the water was boiled, etc., was announced on the stage. The actual boiling of the water was performed at a Notting Hill Gate flat. The complete evaporation of the water was announced from the stage as the ending of the piece.

CLOCK PIECE

Usually a clock is placed on the center of the stage and audience is asked to wait until the alarm goes off.
